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



FEATURED CLAN & TARTAN BUCHANAN

Fàilte! Clan Buchanan, one of the oldest Highland Clans of Scotland, welcomes all to this year's 2025 PNW Scottish Highland Games and Clan Gathering.

We comprise over 50 affiliated families (or Septs) with a history of over 1000 years. Our clan takes its name from the lands extending eastward from Loch Lomond spreading from a tiny island in the Loch to much of Stirlingshire and the Trossachs. Our affiliated families and their geographic locations are just as important as the name Buchanan.

We have strong connections to the wars of Scottish Independence, Scottish royalty and to William Wallace. A Chief was a signatory to the Declaration of Arbroath, we were prominent in the Jacobite uprising, and George Buchanan tutored Mary Queen of Scots and the young king James VI of Scotland who became James I. The Shield of Arms contains these words "Adaces Juvo, Clarior Hinc Honos", I Help the Brave, Brighter Hence the Honor. Our Buchanan motto, "Brighter Hence the Honor" is carried through with our Clan Buchanan Society International motto of "Collegite Fragmenta Ne Pereant", Gather the Pieces Lest They be Lost, reflecting our current linking of members around the world.

Like most Scottish clans, our family was disenfranchised and dispersed across every corner of the globe in the 18th century, but our scattering was particularly extreme as our previous chief died without heir in 1682, and the next likely contender was executed during the Highland Clearances in 1745. In 2022, after almost 340 years without a Chieftain, the Lord Lyons confirmed John Michael Buchanan as "The Buchanan". His formal inauguration occurred in 2022.

Our clan tent is open to all looking into their Scottish history, and welcomes our family as this space is your home at the games. Through information we share, we promote understanding and fellowship among descendants of the peoples of Scotland. We have one of the largest, informative and entertaining websites. Our quarterly magazine informs our members of Clan events around the world, plus provides history, great recipes, and even helps Ancestry research.

Your hosts at these games are Don and Donna McCammon, CBSI Northwest Region Directors. Stop by and learn more about your family, Scottish history, and even, through their many trips back to Scotland, things to see and do in our homeland. We look forward to meeting you and showing how you can become involved with your heritage.

CO-CHIEFTAINS OF THE GAMES - BARB & MIKE WEBB

In celebration of the 78th annual Seattle Scottish Highland Games, we proudly introduce to you this year's Co-Chieftains of the Games, Mike and Barb Webb.

Barb was born in Oak Park, Illinois to George and Lillian Lundberg. Growing up, her best friend was her twin brother Bill. Barb and Bill attended Oak Park-River Forest High School, but moved to Lombard, Illinois for their senior year. George's family-owned businesses in Chicago made awning frameworks and canvas/metal coverings. George designed awnings for places like the Museum of Science and Indus-



try.

Mike was born in Urbana, Illinois, to Robert and Kathryn Webb. His childhood was spent playing with his older sister Sharon and younger brother Roger in their very small rural town. All the siblings went to Ogden elementary school and graduated from St. Joe-Ogden High School. Robert's family's Lumber business built many

of the homes in the surrounding small farm townships.

While taking a break from college for a year, Barb and Mike met through one of their friends. Eight months later, they were married in Ogden, Illinois, and this year will celebrate their 55th anniversary.

After their wedding, they continued their education, and both graduated from the University of Illinois. Barb received a degree in Psychology/Animal Science, and Mike received a degree in Psychology. While in college they worked with autistic children in schools developing educational programs. Following their graduation, they took a job in Kansas as group home parents to adjudicated females. They enrolled in more education classes at the University of Kansas and returned to Illinois a year later.

Barb and Mike consistently used their free time to be outdoors, camping, and/or traveling with their canine companions. Close camping friends of theirs moved to Bellingham the year they returned from Kansas to attend

Western Washington University. After many intriguing conversations, they decided to try life in the Northwest. They thought they would stay for five years and then move to their "dream city", but they have now been in Bellingham for 52 years.

Once they were established in Bellingham, they



both enrolled at WWU. While they worked, they both earned graduate degrees in Education. Barb and Mike personally cleared the forest property around their house, and Barb has created flower gardens that bring joy to their life. She also volunteers her time grooming friends' dogs and helping elderly friends. Her Sheepdog made visits to Memory Care facilities and special education classrooms for many years as a therapy dog.



For their 25th anniversary, they traveled to Rarotonga for a special two weeks. They both took separate trips with their

brothers last year to the Grand Canyon and Sedona. Barb takes a two-week vacation with her twin every year and journeyed to the Oasis at Death Valley this year for a very stimulating adventure. For their 55th anniversary this fall, Barb and Mike are traveling to New York City for fun, and then going to Boxborough, Massachusetts to participate in the Gordon Setter National Dog Show.

He was also one of the original founding members of the Tacoma Highland Games and served as their Piping Chairman for many years.



2011 CHIEFTAIN - REINIS RITELIS

Born September 21, 1942, and passed January 27, 2025. Born in Riga, Latvia, Rei moved to the US with his family when he was 2 during the German occupation. In 1963, Rei enlisted in the Army. There he went to Fixed Radio Station Transmitter school. After completing his enlistment, he hired on at Pacific NW Bell Telephone company, retiring in 2003. Rei was a highly impactful member of both the Latvian and Scottish communities. His dedication to the Seattle Scottish Highland games spanned over 30 years. As the chairman of the Photography committee, he also managed the website and led the setup and take down of many events, as well as managed a majority of the Highland games equipment and storage. Rei's contribution extended way beyond the committee he spent hours with. Rei built the platforms for the dancers, managed the communications during the games and provided financial support for many of the events. THE CÈILIDH

The cèilidh (kay-lee) was the center of social life of the old Highland community. The word translates from the Gaelic to mean "visitor" or "social gathering". In some parts of the Hebrides, the old type of cèilidh was still being held until the early 1900s. Men and lads, sometimes the ladies, would gather at a favored cottage, usually that of one of the more well-to-do residents or the local landlord. There might be someone with a fiddle or pipes, some singing and dancing, and the telling of stories and tall tales.

Modern events billed as cèilidhs are little more than concerts with a Scottish flavor, but we believe the old idea of sharing and group participation is best. Our cèilidhs blend the best of the old and the new with piping, singing, dancing, creative skits, and more.

Join in and sing a few songs, step through a reel or two, and enjoy the company of kith and kin. Participants compete for the "Caber," a perpetual trophy donated by the Richard Roberts family, which the audience awards to the best Scottish entertainment of the evening.

Leave your worries at the door, tap your toes to the music, laugh a lot, and, above all, have a good time and make some new Scottish friends!

A WORD TO THE WISE

In the past we have had a problem with folks attempting to gain access to the Pubs who do not have a piece of valid picture ID on their person. At our pubs we do not carry a banquet permit. We actually carry the same type of license as a tavern.

The Washington State Liquor Control board has issued a statement that patrons within the confines of the pubs must be at least 21 years of age and no matter what age you must have valid picture ID. Anyone entering the pub area will be asked as we do not want to jeopardize our



ability to carry a license in the future. If you cannot produce a valid picture ID we will not be able to admit you!

Please note: The Washington State Liquor Control Board mandates that outside of products we provide in the pubs under license, to be consumed in the pubs, no outside alcohol may be brought into the Expo Center for personal consumption. Please leave your flasks and coolers at home. It was explained to us by the liquor inspector who came on site last year that SSHGA was tasked with enforcing this rule and not doing so would jeopardize our ability to procure a license. The pubs account for a good portion of our funds that allow us to sponsor these Games. Please adhere to this request so we can successfully provide this amazing celebration for many years to come!

FAMOUS SCOTS OF THE PNW - DAVID DOUGLAS

Douglas fir trees are ubiquitous in the Pacific Northwest, but few people are aware of the name's origin. Well, we can thank a Scotsman for it!

David Douglas, born in 1799 in Scone, Perthshire, Scotland, was an indifferent student as a boy, much preferring to explore the surrounding countryside. After leaving school he apprenticed as a gardener for seven years at Scone Palace, attended college in Perth for a short time, and then attended botany lectures at the Botanical Gardens of Glasgow University. He became a favorite

student of Professor William Hooker, who recommended Douglas to the Royal Horticultural Society.

Douglas made expeditions to the Pacific Northwest three times to collect seeds and specimens for the Society. He explored the Northwest extensively, using the Hudson Bay Company at Fort Vancouver as his base in 1825-27, 1830, and 1832-33. Although he

was working as a botanist, he studied the whole range of the natural world, from rocks and minerals to birds and animals (are

you familiar with our native Douglas squirrel?). During his 1825 visit, he sent 499 species of plants back to England, most of them unknown at the time, and the trip is ranked as one of the great botanical explorations in history. Over 80 species of plants and animals now have douglasii in their scientific name, with many more (including Douglas fir) named after him in common usage. Interestingly, the scientific name for Douglas fir is Pseudotsuga menziesii, named for Archibald Menzies, another Scotsman! Menzies was a physician and naturalist who first documented the tree on Vancouver Island in 1791, but it was Douglas who reported the long-lived nature and timber potential of the tree.

Sadly, Douglas died at the young age of 35 under mysterious circumstances while exploring the island of Hawai'i. But he left an amazing legacy for future Scots to be proud of.

BRASS RUBBINGS

Take home a souvenir brass rubbing from the Pacific Northwest Scottish Highland Games & Clan Gathering! It's a great way to have some creative fun with a historical twist.

The Seattle Scottish Highland Games Association recently received a donation of replica brass monuments from churches and cathedrals across the United Kingdom. You can emulate your Victorian-era ancestors by making rubbings of these brasses, which involves putting paper over the image and drawing back and forth over the raised design with a crayon. It's fun and easy for all ages. We have a variety of replica brasses for you to choose from.

Monumental brasses are engraved commemorative plaques made in Western Europe from the 13th – 16th centuries. They partially took the place of 3-dimensional monuments, as they were set into the floor of the church and did not obstruct the aisles. They have become an important historical resource because they include intricate details of family history, heraldic designs, period clothing and types of armor. Noblemen and women, as well as civilians and prosperous merchants, were memorialized in brasses.

A huge thank you goes out to Melinda Rand and her husband for their generous donation of the brass replicas. You can find the brass rubbing tables in the Celtic Marketplace building. We'll be open all day on Saturday and Sunday. The cost varies depending on the size chosen, and all materials are provided. We were also donated a number of completed rubbings that will be available to purchase.

NORTH WEST SHIELD WALL

Learn to hold your ground and wield your sword like the Vikings did; for victory or VALHALLA!

Up to 22 participants per performance get to learn how to wield and fight with a wooden sword and shield and how to stand their ground in a Shield wall (Ages 15+)

In the shield wall, participants defend themselves from the audiences barrage.

Their booth also serves as a hands-on museum, library and merchant table for wares we have recreated or collected. None of the weapons are sharp, so you are invited to feel the weight and power of a dane axe, try on some chainmail and a helmet or have an eye for knowledge in our library. Smaller foam swords and shields are also available for kids to learn from real Vikings!

OF KIRKIN' AND TARTANS

Kirk: Scottish word for church

The Kirkin' is strictly a North American tradition that celebrates Scotland and Scottish heritage. While most Scottish folk will look at you with a blank expression when asked about 'the Kirkin' of the Tartan,' its origins go back into Scottish history. Alexander Carmichael in his collection of Highland folklore, prayers, charms and omens (Carmina Gadelica) includes a prayer for 'the consecration of the cloth,' but there is no mention of its origins.



The Scotts have always had strong Christian convictions, whether they are Catholic or Protestant, and have always observed Sunday as the Lord's Day, a day of rest and worship. This was the day when the Sunday or dress kilt was worn—a finer quality wool kilt with more white than was in the everyday kilt. Because of the significance of the family tartan in helping to unite the clans in the old days, a special event was held every year. The clansmen gathered together, dressed in their finest tartan, to rededicate themselves to service to

their Heavenly Father and to give thanks for His watchful care over them during the year.


This service was known to have taken place in the time of the Protestant Reformation in the 1500s. By the time of the Proscription of 1746, which outlawed the wearing of anything tartan by any Scot, this ceremony obviously could not be held. There is evidence some clansmen took to carrying swatches of the material to kirk concealed on their person. At some point in the service, the clergyman would give a blessing and the clansmen would touch their bits of tartan. With no overt signal given, a sort of underground Kirkin' would take place.

Most writings on the subject seem to agree that the first Kirkin' was the subject of a sermon in support of British War Relief, and thus established here in the United States. The sermon was written and delivered by Dr. Peter Marshall, originally from Coatbridge, Scotland, at the New York Avenue Presbyterian Church in Washington, DC, on April 27, 1941 (although a 1943 date is also mentioned), and was to fund a mobile kitchen. At that time, Dr. Marshall was also Chaplain of the Senate and Chaplain of the St. Andrew's Society of Washington, DC. He is also known as being the central figure of the book and 1955 movie "A Man Called Peter," in which he was played by Richard Todd. Central to the theme of Kirkin' is the presentation of the Tartans of Clan, Region, and Regiment, symbolizing rededication of Scots everywhere to God's service. It is enhanced by the beauty of the singing of the Psalms, the color and dignity of the presentation, and the close bond of fellowship sensed by all who attend.

Kirkin's are held year round, with the most frequent dates being St. Andrew's Day (November 30) and Tartan Day (April 6), as well as at Highland Games and Gatherings.

We welcome you to this service of Kirkin' on behalf of The Seattle Scottish Highland Games Association, held at the North Stage at 9 am on Sunday.

ON FLAGS AND ANTHEMS

There seems to be a bit of confusion in the minds of some attendees at our event about the protocol when it comes to the flags and anthems. The international flags that we have represented in our main grandstand area are the U.S., Canadian, and U.K. flags, and also the Scottish flag (St. Andrew's Cross) and the Royal flag (Rampant Lion). The color guard at all four massed bands will carry a minimum of the international flags. At the welcoming ceremonies on both Saturday and Sunday, "The Flower of Scotland," "God Save the King," "O Canada," and "The Star Spangled Banner" are all sung.

And, of course, political considerations (in the form of protocol) are involved. (Let's face it; we are dealing with a heritage and country that has a hierarchy based on a feudal system that, to a certain degree, is still in effect today.) We have checked with the British Consulate, Lord Lyon, and the Scottish Parliament for the current proper protocol. The Etiquette of the Stars and Stripes as revised by Public Law 94-344 states that only recognized international flags can be flown at the same level as the Stars and Stripes, and their anthems sung. Thus, the international flag of the U.K., the "Union Jack," is flown and "God Save the King" is the anthem sung at our welcoming ceremonies.

The Scottish Parliament Public Information Service provided the following information:

"Firstly, it is important to note that the Scottish Parliament can only legislate on devolved matters and that Scotland is not an independent country, therefore the official national anthem throughout the UK continues to be "God Save the King." However, (as you know) Scottish songs are still frequently used at national sporting events and international competitions. These include "The Flower of Scotland" (at international rugby matches) and "Scotland the Brave" (at the Commonwealth Games). Therefore, I see no reason why you could not use either of these at your highland gatherings as well.

"Secondly, 'THE SALTIRE' is the official Scottish flag, the flag of St. Andrew, patron saint of Scotland. The Court of the Lord Lyon states, 'Blue* with a white or silver diagonal cross reaching to its edges, this is the correct flag for all Scots or Scottish corporate bodies to fly to demonstrate their loyalty and their Scottish nationality.'

"There is a second flag which is associated with Scotland, the 'Lion Rampant,' or Royal flag of Scotland. Strictly

speaking, the Royal flag of Scotland should only be used by the monarch in relation to his capacity as King in Scotland."

Unfortunately, as much as we would like Scotland to be free of England, currently it's not. We are presenting an accurate representation of the past and present Scotland.

Hendersons from the Caithness region have ties to the Clan Gunn.

Please stop by the Clan Henderson tent and welcome Alistair D. Henderson of Fordell, Chief of the Arms and Names of Henderson.

Alistair D. Henderson of Fordell, was recognized as Chief of the Name and Arms of the Baronial House of Henderson by the Lord Lyon in 2005 following the passing of his father Dr. John William Philp Henderson of Fordell. Alistair currently resides in Torwood, a suburb of Brisbane, Australia. He is an electrical engineer, presently consulting in the field of air pollution control and travels throughout South East Asia.

Alistair is interested in Scottish history, and is a member of the Heraldry Society of Scotland, the Scottish Genealogy Society, and the Genealogical Society of Queensland. He is also a Fellow of the Society of Antiquaries of Scotland.

PARTICIPATING DOG BREEDS

GUN DOGS

Gordon Setters

Gordon Setters have existed in Scotland since 1620 and were first known as the Black-and-Tan Setter. They became better known some 200 years later when they could be found in the kennels of Alexander, the fourth Duke of Gordon where they were very successful as hunting dogs. This is an active breed that loves to run, so the Gordon does require a fair amount of exercise.

Welsh Springer Spaniels

The Welsh Springer Spaniel is an ancient breed and is an active dog displaying a loyal and affectionate disposition. The Welsh Springer is a gentle family dog and prefers to be with his people. The Welsh Springer is often referred to as a "Velcro" dog as you cannot go anywhere without your shadow.

Irish Water Spaniels

Often mistaken for Poodles, the Irish Water Spaniel is one of the oldest Spaniel breeds. They love to swim. With webbed feet and a two-layered, water repellent coat, they are perfectly suited to retrieve waterfowl for hunters. They are often referred to as the clowns of the Spaniel family.

HERDING DOGS

Rough Collies

The Rough Collie is a highly intelligent and loyal breed. Famous for its role in the TV show "Lassie," Rough Collies have a distinctive, beautiful coat. Rough Collies originated in the Scottish Highlands in the 18th century, where they were bred with great care by farmers and shepherds to possess

the mix of fearlessness, aggression, determination, and strength required for herding and guarding hardheaded flocks of sheep.

Smooth Collies

Smooth Collies originated along with Rough Collies in the Scottish Highlands in the 18th century. Rough and Smooth Collies are separate breeds however. Smooths are currently considered endangered in the UK.

Border Collies

This highly intelligent, graceful dog is born with an instinct to work and responds extremely well to training, which is why they are often used as a mountain rescue or sniffer dog. Border Collies make loyal, faithful pets that thrive on company and stimulation.

Shetland Sheepdogs – Shelties

Bright and eager Shelties are easy trainers and world-class competitors in obedience, agility, and herding trials. They are sensitive and affectionate family dogs, highly in tune with the mood of the household. They like to bark and tend to be reserved toward strangers - two qualifications of an excellent watchdog.

Cardigan Welsh Corgis

One of the oldest breeds in the British Isles, this dog was brought to Cardiganshire in Wales by Celtic tribes around 1200 B.C. Cardiganshire is a rough, rocky area located in southwest Wales. The dogs were raised to be farmworkers and herd animals, as well as be a family pet.

TERRIERS

Scottish Terriers - Scotties

The iconic Scottish Terrier originated in Aberdeen, Scotland. Feisty, independent, and sometimes excitable, Scottish terriers are often described as a big dog in a little dog's body. There have been many famous Scotties: In the US, President Franklin Roosevelt had his beloved Fala; President George W. Bush had Scotties Barney and Miss Beazley. Scotties need moderate amounts of exercise and do well living in the city or country.

West Highland White Terriers - Westies

The Westie has been around for 300 years and is one of the most popular terriers. While the Westie might have the appearance of a charming little dog, it's very courageous, wise, and strong. The breed reaches a height of 10 inches to 11 inches, has a compact

body, and dark eyes. Calm and quiet in the house, these fun-loving dogs will relish a run around outside. This intelligent breed is a quick learner and loves training, as long as they know what's in it for them! Westies have a lot of self-esteem and respond best to positive training methods.

Cairn Terriers

The name "Cairn" comes from the stone memorials that have been erected in Scotland. Many would recognize the breed from Dorothy's dog Toto in the movie "The Wizard of Oz". They are happy, friendly dogs. Very playful and loved by children.

Glens were bred to hunt silently, going "mute to ground" after badgers, foxes, and other small game. Being genetically dwarves, Glens are short but not small. They only stand up to 14" tall, yet at 35 to 40 lbs. are quite muscular.

Dandie Dinmont Terriers

One of the rarest & oldest Terrier breeds, it gets its name from Sir Walter Scott's 1815 novel "Guy Mannering" whose character, Dandie Dinmont, is based on a real-life breeder, James Davidson, who is credited as the originator of the modern breed. While they tend to be snuggly and affectionate, the AKC characterizes

prisingly low-energy and can adapt to apartment living. Queen Victoria was a big fan and bred Skye Terriers in her royal kennels.

Kerry Blue Terriers

Among the largest of AKC Terriers, the Kerry Blue Terrier is famous for his show-stopping blue coat. The Kerry is born black and changes color as he ages. Bred to be an all-purpose farm dog, the Kerry is one of only 2 Terriers that can earn a herding degree. Kerries love their humans, but like many terriers, they aren't always friendly towards other dogs. The breed is active and does require regular exercise although given their nature dog parks may not be a good environment for them.

HOUNDS

Irish Wolf Hound

The National breed of Ireland. The calm, dignified, and kindly Irish Wolfhound is the tallest of all AKC breeds. An ancient breed, the Irish Wolfhound is an immense, muscular hound gracefully built along classic Greyhound lines, capable of great speed at the gallop. A male might stand nearly 3 feet at the shoulder and weigh up to 180 pounds. Females will run smaller but are still a whole lot of hound. The rough, hard coat comes in many colors. IWs are too serene to be fierce guard dogs, but just the sight of them is enough to deter intruders.



West Highland White Terrier

Border Terriers

Originally bred to work alongside horses and hounds, the Border Terrier tends to get on with people and animals alike. Sociable, playful, affectionate and cheeky, Border Terriers are great family dogs for active households with lots going on.

Glen of Imaal Terriers

Another rare Terrier breed, the Glen was bred to help on small farms in the Wicklow mountains of Ireland. In contrast to most smaller Terriers,

them as a "tough but dignified little exterminator". They come in two spicy colors: "pepper" and "mustard".





The Events

The Heavy Events have been contested at Highland Games for centuries, starting with games set up by King Malcolm III of Scotland in the 11th century to select the strongest men in Scotland to serve as personal bodyguards. Implements used are those that were in use at the period of history, blacksmith's weights, hammers used for driving fence posts, stones from the local rivers and trees cut down by woodsmen. There are eight traditional events that you will see contested and all are a true test of not only strength but skill and athleticism.

Sheaf Toss

The Sheaf is a burlap sack weighing up to 20 lbs., thrown for height using a pitchfork. Three attempts at each height. Greatest height is the winner!

Putting the Stone

The precursor to the modern Olympic shot put, the Stone Put is thrown in two styles. The Braemar Stone, a standing throw with no approach (stone weighing up to 28lbs). The Open Stone (weighing up to 20lbs) with the option of an approach (glide, spin, etc.)

Throwing the Hammer

The Hammer is a weighted head attached to a rigid PVC/Ratan handle. The Hammer is rotated overhead, back to target and released over the shoulder. The Light Hammer weighs 16lbs for Men and 12lbs for Women and the Heavy Hammer weighs 22lbs for Men and 16lbs for Women.

Weight for Height

Weight for Height is one of the greatest tests of explosive power in Heavy Events. A 56lbs weight (for Men) and 28lbs (for Women) is thrown with one hand overhead for height. Three attempts at each height. The highest cleared height determines the winner.

Weight for Distance

Using a spinning technique to throw either the Light Weight (28lbs for Men and 14lbs for Women) or the Heavy Weight (56lbs for Men and 28lbs for Women) for distance. A ball and chain measuring no more than 18" and thrown with one hand.


Tossing the Caber

A Caber is a tapered log measuring up to 20+ feet and 100+lbs. The athlete attempts to "pick" the Caber and balance it holding the small end. They then run with the Caber and attempt to flip the Caber end over end. The Caber is not thrown for distance but rather accuracy using the hands of a clock. The goal is for the Caber to flip and land straight in line with direction of run, a perfect score being at 12 o'clock. Watch for the Judge raising their hands like a touchdown to designate a perfect score.






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BANDS, PIPING & DRUMMING

What Judges Are Looking For

Individual Piping

When judging individual pipers, the judge evaluates two main categories: 1) tuning the bagpipe, and 2) playing ability.

Judging the tuning of the bagpipe involves noting whether the chanter (part of the bagpipe that produces nine musical notes in B flat) is adjusted correctly, using the appropriate reed; whether or not the drone reeds (attached inside the three wood shafts on the shoulder) are set accordingly for balance and accurate blending of the bass and two tenor drone tones; and whether all three drones are tuned to be compatible with the pitch of the chanter.

Judging of playing ability focuses on fingering control as well as disciplined, regulated blowing into the bag. This, in turn, produces a constant and steady tone that provides a lower background tone, thereby complementing the melody pattern of the chanter. The chanter's high-pitched tone produces notes similar to that of the classical oboe. The steady lower pitch sound is a very important skill, and one to which the judge pays particular attention. The piping judge ranks each piper based on proper blowing of the bagpipe (chanter and drones), technical fingering of the music, tempo of the tune played, and musical expression. Each piper is carefully evaluated to ensure the tunes are executed as the composition was written. Some of the bagpipe tunes played today are centuries old; others, however, have been written in recent years by some very talented North American piping composers. Judging this remarkable musical instrument, considered to be one of the most difficult in the world to master, is not an easy task.

Individual Drumming — Snare & Tenor

The snare drummer's primary responsibility is to add rhythm accompaniment to the bagpiper's tune. The drumming judge evaluates the skill levels of drum tuning, rudimental technique, and musical expression. Each skill is equally important, as the drummers attempt to demonstrate



a polished arrangement based on enhancing each pipe tune with their own unique rhythmic style or preference of drum playing. Drummers use different methods of selecting arrangements for each pipe tune. Some use standard compositions, while others compose their own arrangements. Each arrangement is designed to complement the tune. One interesting characteristic of individual drummers is their ability to perform using dynamics with expression and shading. Drummers can soften their playing volume and flow with heavy staccato accents to enhance the bag-

pipe melody. Oftentimes, a performer can be judged technically perfect, yet without demonstrating expression and shading, a competitor would lack the finished, polished touch that makes an individual drummer's performance first rate.

The second individual drumming competitor is the tenor drummer. The

tenor drum has the appearance (size and shape) of a snare drum, but without the raspy high pitch sound. Tenor drummers not only perform highly complex flourishing (twirling the sticks) movements, but also syncopated rhythm patterns that complement the overall drum section arrangement. The drumming judge evaluates the overall performance of the flourishing and the playing of the drum. The smoothness of transitions between the skills can affect the level of performance.

Drum Section Competition

Drum competition allows each drum corps a chance to exhibit additional creativity without concerning themselves with following the bagpipe. In addition, the drum sections can let loose with anything that demonstrates drumming ability—tones can be changed, choreographed routines added, etc. Some drum sections will add tastefully prepared humor in order to separate their performance from the others. The drumming judge keeps all the basic requirements in mind while evaluating each performance.

Pipe Bands

Pipe bands are evaluated by four judges—two for piping, one for drumming, and one for the ensemble. Piping judges' responsibilities are similar to judging individual pipers. However, they are particularly concerned with the identical playing and tuning of the pipers as a group. All

chanters and drones must be tuned for maximum uniformity of sound, while at the same time allowing for richness of tone, and equal volume of each bagpipe.

While there are similarities in judging individual drumming and drum corps, the difference the drumming judge must consider includes the number of snare drummers within the drum corps. There are two other types of drummers added to the drum section—bass drums and tenor drums. The drumming judge must take into consideration the overall drum section rhythm sound. All three types of drums work together to display a multi-rhythmic effect that maintains a musically expressive accompaniment to the pipe section. The snare drummers are attempting to achieve the same exact togetherness as if it were only one drummer playing.

The ensemble judge is responsible for evaluating the complete musical expression of the band as it works together as a whole. Areas such as combined expression of the music, volume or tone imbalance between the pipes and drums, and smoothness of drum section arrangement to the tunes are just a few of the considerations the judge must recognize.

Pipe bands are graded into five levels for competition, from Grade 1, the highest ability level, to Grade 5, the novice category. As a band becomes more experienced, it is placed in a grade higher.

Recognized as a sport by the Sport Council of Scotland, dances such as the Highland Fling and the Gillie Calum (the Sword Dance) are so vigorous that one must be in top physical shape to perform them. Long hours of practice are required for a dancer to become proficient enough to dance the intricate figures lightly and gracefully as they should be danced. Originally, Highland dances were danced only by men, but women began competing in the late 19th century, and today more than 95% of all dancers are women.

The following are some of the dances you will see in the competition this weekend. Judges evaluate a dancer on three major criteria: timing, technique, and interpretation/overall deportment.



DANCING

Highland Fling—A dance of victory in battle

Traditionally, ancient warriors and clansmen performed this dance on the small round shield (called a targe) which they carried into battle. The quick footwork and dexterity of the dancer is understandable when you learn that most targes carried a sharp spike of metal projecting some five or six inches from its center. A false or careless step could be more than a little painful!

Gillie Calum—A dance of war

No Highland dance is older or better known than the Gillie Calum (Sword Dance), and there are many theories of its origins. One theory is that King Malcolm III (reigned 1058-1093) killed a rival chieftain and then celebrated by dancing over both the men's crossed swords; another is that the dance would be performed before battle, and if a dancer's foot touched a sword it was a sign of bad luck and the men would lose the battle.

Seann Triubhas (Pronounced 'shawn trews')

Translating to 'old trousers' in Gaelic, this dance refers to the 1782 repeal of the banning of the kilt after the Jacobite Uprising. The movements and motions depict a person impatient to shed his trousers and get back to the freedom of wearing his native Highland kilt.

Reels

Legend has it that the reels originated when wedding guests, waiting for the minister to arrive at the kirk on a cold day, improvised a dance as a way to keep warm. Of all the competitive Highland dances, the reels are the



closest to social dancing. The teams consist of four dancers, but the judges mark each competitor individually.

Sailor's Hornpipe

This was originally a dance common to many parts of the British Isles, named for the accompanying "hornpipe," an instrument comparable to the tin flute. The dance became so popular among seafaring men that it became known as the "Sailor's Hornpipe." The dance is performed in a British sailor's uniform and imitates many typical shipboard activities such as hauling rope, sliding on the rollicking deck, and climbing the rigging.

Irish Jig

The Irish Jig danced at Highland Games is meant to be a parody of an Irish person in an agitated state of mind. While the steps are traditional, the arm movements are not. Arm movements are an intrinsic part of Scottish dancing, so the Scots added

them to the Irish Jig in a humorous salute to their Celtic brethren, who hold their arms beside their bodies while doing Irish step dancing.

Scottish Lilt, Flora Macdonald, Blue Bonnets, Scotch Measure, & Village Maid

These are the dances known as the Scottish National Dances, and are of more modern origin. In America, they were not danced in competition until the 1960s. The attire worn by the dancers is known as the Aboyne Dress, originating from the Aboyne Highland Games in Aberdeenshire where women were banned from wearing kilts. The National Dances are very similar to Highland dances, but are more flowing and ballet-like and the rhythms are often more complicated than for Highland dancing.

Choreography

Choreography is a special form of Highland dancing developed by individuals or groups of dancers who compose a dance based on basic movements of Highland and National Dances and put them to Scottish music. Dancers are judged on technique, timing, and originality.

NATIONAL TARTAN DAY APRIL 6

The contribution of the immigrant Scots to North America is massive, and Scots have remained proud of their heritage. Numerous groups and societies throughout Canada and the United States have taken the anniversary of the Declaration of Arbroath as the day to celebrate their Scottish roots. On December 19, 1991, in response to action initiated by the Clans & Scottish Societies of Canada, the Ontario Legislature passed a resolution proclaiming April 6 as Tartan Day. The U.S. followed suit on March 20, 1998, when Senate Resolution 155 was passed unanimously. This was followed by an almost identical companion bill, House Resolution 41, which was passed on March 9, 2005. The resolutions are as follows:

Whereas, April 6 has a special significance for all Americans, and especially those Americans of Scottish descent, because the Declaration of Arbroath, the Scottish Declaration of Independence, was signed on April 6, 1320 and the American Declaration of Independence was modeled on that inspirational document; Whereas, this resolution honors the major role that Scottish Americans played in the founding of this Nation, such as the fact that almost half of the signers of the Declaration of Independence were of Scottish descent, the Governors in 9 of the original 13 States were of Scottish ancestry, Scottish Americans successfully helped

shape this country in its formative years and guide this Nation through its most troubled times; Whereas, this resolution recognized the monumental achievements and invaluable contributions made by Scottish Americans that have led to America's preeminence in the fields of science, technology, medicine, government, politics, economics, architecture, literature, media, and visual and performing arts; Whereas, this resolution commends the more than 200 organizations throughout the United States that honor Scottish heritage, tradition, and culture, representing the hundreds of thousands of Americans of Scottish descent, residing in every State, who already have made the observance of Tartan Day on April 6 a success; Whereas, these numerous individuals, clans, societies, clubs, and fraternal organizations do not let the great contributions of the Scottish people go unnoticed: Now, therefore, be it Resolved, that the Senate (and the House of Representatives) designates April 6 of each year as "National Tartan Day."
